Some 2025 highlights of PAMI ministries:

In March/April, Samaritan's Purse supplied 300 Operation Christmas Child boxes, along with teaching/discipleship materials (100 each for Histas in Candumaay/Culasi Matnog, Camars in Prieto Diaz, & Frestos in Casiguran/Bulusan-pg 2).



On May 23, 3 graduated from EBI. Of these, PAMI retained Vincent and Shanie as workers, along with Marites from the class of 2024. Marites married Ptr Ruel in March, and they are starting a house church in Cabugawan Bulusan. In April, Ptr Felmar married school teacher Jen, and they moved into the 2nd floor (living quarters) of Fabrica Bulan Church.

The biggest event of the year was a week-long Music Camp held at EBI in June and attended by 100 youth from different PAMI churches, learning various instruments, preparing to be worship leaders. The big event for next year might be a Sports Fest or Crusade involving these same youth.

Besides financial gifts, could use donations of **used laptops, projectors, digital cameras, Christian books & CDs, school supplies, hotel sized toiletries, toothbrushes, t-shirts, baseball hats, small toys, etc. to ship in balikbayan boxes.**



Also in June was Breakthrough II, youth leader training.

In August was a reunion, attended by 45 of EBI's 132 grads. Also in August was the start of the new EBI school year, with one Freshman and 11 returning students (including 4 interns). \$100 per semester secular college scholarships were issued/reissued to 24 exceptional PAMI young people. MISSION SUMMARY

PAMI is a non-denominational evangelical mission started in 1982 in Sorsogon Province of the Philippines, aimed at reaching the unreached, teaching and discipling, and assisting the poor. U.S. missionaries stayed until 1989. The work has flourished with national workers ever since. The mission has 20+ PAMI-paid Filipino workers in 20+ places. Besides churches and outreaches, there's a 4 year Bible school (Emmaus Bible Institute) with 12 students learning to be church planting pastors and Christian workers. EBI also is a center for 180 Compassion sponsored kids. Radio shows and milk feeding outreaches to children are also conducted. All this is accomplished with an annual budget of only \$80,000. Gifts are tax-deductible and 100% goes to the field.

One branch of PAMI is led by Pastor Winston & Espie Fresto, based out of Mabini, Casiguran. This page highlights some of their ministry:



Sunday services & feedings at Mabini are ongoing, followed by Next Gen discipleship of youth.



5 of these youth were baptized on May 16 at Bayugin Falls. It was a fun day for the whole church and children that are part of OCC discipleship.

When Mabini qualified for 100 OCC boxes to go to new recipients, half were brought to San Francisco Bulusan (to precede a Children's Concert there) and half to Talinga Juban (a place found by a Next Gen youth named Jane who wanted to teach kids there).



Winston is part of a group of pastors called the Rock Riders. They were part of a parade that ushered in a Children's Concert.



Espie has been sharing with young people in churches in various towns a Teenage Pregnancy Prevention seminar that she got from attending an AWANA workshop.
